


Super 3 final drive really looks the business




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Any leaks Andy?

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600 MILES IN A 70-YEAR-OLD

I'm always nervous before a big run like this, previous attempts between my home in Doncaster and my regular bed in Hampshire had largely been OK now the overheating issues were sorted, but my last run hadn't gone so well as a treacherous faulty bearing in my speedo had bamboozled me into thinking something more serious was afoot and delayed my return run by around 2 hours whilst the cause was found. This time though, I had spent a great deal of the spring getting on top of the various issues troubling the car, and whilst she's not perfect I was more confident this time around.

A 9am appointment in the village of Grazeley Green near Reading meant that I was up before the sun. I rolled her out the garage and did one last check of the fluids under torchlight before jumping in the spongy upright driver's seat, pulled the choke hard against the steering wheel and holding the starter button down until the standard vanguard engine drowned out the dawn chorus, dashing any hope the local wildlife had of finding a mate that morning.

I was following my tried and tested route south, A1, A46, M1, A43, M40, A34; this limits my time on the busier sections of motorway and still allows me to cruise at 60mph. At this speed the vanguard engine hums away at 3000rpm with a drone akin to that of a WW2 fighter. Given the time of day the traffic was largely light with only a few minor accidents hindering the otherwise fault free journey, closures on the A34 meant I was able to take a much more picturesque route through the Chilterns.



My appointment was with Richard Thorne Classic Cars, who is a Morgan and Lancia specialist, but does frequently deal in other marques. They sold me the car a year and a half ago, and had done quite a bit to help me keep her running in the meantime. But I wanted their wise eyes to give my car the once over. I was pleased to see they passed the car to Matt, who is a former McLaren Designer/Engineer and a real wiz with the spanner, and will usually be found in the paddock if a Morgan is racing.

I was dropped off at the pub whilst the team took a look over my car. Around 4 hours later, I was brought back to and taken though the faults. Fortunately, nothing terminal was found, and much

of the work consisted of tightening bolts that had shaken themselves loose over the last year and a half. I was pleased to see that compressions were good across all 4 cylinders; they had made some adjustments to the steering to make it tighter and more manageable at speed.

After the paying the very fair bill I set off through the south Wessex downs AONB finally arriving at Andover at 5pm, she's not a hugely exhausting car to drive long distances, but I still took advantage of the bed and quiet house to get an early night.

Day 2

Day 2 began with a lovely hand pulled cappuccino and an inspection of the car. I was pleased to see she was doing a better job of retaining oil and improvements across the car meant she was now achieving around 20 mpg allowing me to complete the whole run on a single tank. A radiator stay had however finally become detached from its mounting point. Though not critical it was an issue that would need to be resolved later.

Hampshire will always have a place in my heart. The rolling hills and chalk streams that crisscross the county provide an exciting prospect for a budding explorer. There can be a welcoming village just around the next corner. My guide was a very close friend Steve, his knowledge of the villages in Northern Hampshire never ceases to surprise me and there is always a new area to explore. Stocksbridge is always a hive of activity, so a drive there for breakfast and clay pigeon shoot sorted us for the morning.



An exploration of the surrounding villages was cut somewhat short by the only bit of rain we saw all weekend. Fortunately, at the village of Horsebridge one can find the village pub John of Gaunt. A small but well-loved community pub, with kitchen and bar staff that quite clearly love their roles, Delicious food and drink was served to us within minutes of arrival. Once the rain had cleared the sun returned and we drove the car back towards Andover, taking in the beautiful countryside and villages of Stocksbridge once again, as well as Leckford, Chilbolton and Wherwell.

Day 3



Day 3 Started with a thorough clean of the car with whatever I could find in Steve's house. She was off to West Tytherley village fete today and was required to look her best. Richard the organizer, had planned a classic car show for the fete but neglected to invite nearly everyone except himself. He had heard I was down through Steve and insisted I attend, hoping to pull in a few other classics from his neighbours too. I roared off towards Winchester Auto Barn for breakfast. The Auto Barn is a newly established site that's looking to become a Car and Coffee meeting point. At the crossroads A30 and A272, with the sun beating down I was expecting a packed venue with plenty to see, but was surprised to find it empty with only Debbie tinkering away on her Coffee van ready to serve.

I pulled up the car in a prominent spot visible to passing traffic. And was immediately welcomed with the smell of fresh coffee and a locally sourced cheese and ham toastie.
